
## Happenings





Many women who come to
Sojourner Truth House have
neglected their mental and
emotional health. Maybe they can't
afford it, or pride or fear of being
stigmatized prevents them from
seeking help. This was the case with
Tamara, who entered our doors
tattered, torn, tortured and toothless.

"As I observed her motionless body and her facial expression of a glazed stare, I said to myself she is not going to make it," says Pam Key, Director of Client Services at STH. "Bewildered in her own weariness, she explained to me that she'd been homeless for years, living from one abandoned building to the next. When I asked if she had previous substance usage or any form of physical or mental

health issues, her tears began to roll into an uncontrollable crying spell. I could only support her with tissue, and from time to time I held her hand so she could gather herself. She shared about failures in her past, her road to addiction, and all the abuse, abandonment, abortions and addictions. I said to myself that if she returned on the following work day we had a fighting chance."

"She came back!"

Slowly and cautiously, Tamara began the process of recovery to wellness. She embraced the support services and classes at STH, and after months of commitment and work, Tamara finally received the keys to her own apartment.

"As we stood in her living room, the tears began to roll—however, this time from both of us, and the meaning of these tears were amazement, accomplishment and achievement," Pam said. "As we drove back to STH, she informed me that we were near the abandoned houses that she'd been living in the past four years. It was so surreal—her past was on that street, and we had just celebrated her present a few miles back."

"It dawned on me that Tamara had a home all along," she shared. "That home was on the inside—it was her inner self that no longer needed a push, that inner Spirit inside that shares with us and reminds us that there is a safe place called home."


We've recently been through a season of horrific police brutality and white supremacy, and witnessed the power of community as Americans of all ethnicities marched and protested together to bring an end to systemic racism. Following the murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis, we posted a statement on our website condemning that action, and acknowledging that the U.S. was built on the stolen land of the indigenous; our economy constructed on the backs of stolen Black bodies; and that our dominant white culture has been preserved through lynchings, Jim Crow laws, mass incarceration, red lining, police brutality and other means. Our statement also says:



"And many of us live this privilege even if unawares simply due to the whiteness of our skin. This is why we believe that Black Lives Matter is an important statement—because they haven't mattered and it should now be obvious to all. We stand with our Black brothers and sisters in the struggle to attain a true equality, true equity, true economic and health parity and a true welcoming into American society ... We pray that we all learn the history we need to learn; that we all hear the pain of centuries of untold subjugation; that we all look into our own hearts, especially those of us privileged by the color of our skin, and believe that transformation can and must happen."


As our namesake asked nearly 170 years ago:

Isabella Baumfree was born in 1797 to slave parents in Ulster County, New York. When she was about 9 years old, she and a flock of sheep were sold at a slave auction for \$100. As was the case for most slaves in the rural North, Isabella lived isolated from other African Americans, and she suffered from physical and sexual abuse at the hands of her masters.

In 1826, Isabella's owner promised to grant her freedom on July 4th, if "she would do well and be faithful." When the date arrived, however, he had a change of heart and refused to let her go. Isabella had completed what she felt was her obligation to this man so, inspired

All STH programs lead to stable housing—but helping women and families obtain housing involves more than just getting a roof over their heads. Homeless clients have few possessions, so we also try to provide some essential household items—furniture, dishes, linens, etc. It takes a lot of space to store these items, which are often donated.
