After 23 years—which began at the founding of Sojourner Truth House (STH) in 1997—Sister Peg Spindler, CSA, is retiring as executive director.

She and Sr. Joan Fisher, PHJC, originally developed a modest program to fill the need for laundry services, referrals and low-income-housing resources for local women. When Missionaries of Charity established a homeless shelter for women and children—with help from the Diocese of Gary—Sisters Peg and Joan offered to do case management for their clients.

"We've been doing case management and programming for the women and children of that shelter ever since, and now, for single women at the Lydia House (a shelter run by the Lutheran Church),"

Sr. Peg said. "We added the food pantry and clothes closet very shortly after we opened, going from the convent to purchasing the present ministry building and renovating it slowly over the years into what it is today. The mission of STH has grown and deepened beyond our wildest expectations! I am proud to have

been part of this evolving ministry for 23 years."

Now, after lots of thought and introspection, she thinks it's time to give someone else a chance to

lead the ministry. Sister Peg will be volunteering with the Continuum of Care Network of NWI, (of which STH has been a member for years), to continue her ministry of passion for the homeless, and to

develop a system to open new channels—and funding—for getting more homeless into housing.

You may still find her helping in the STH food pantry—or promoting local environmental causes. "It will be very hard to walk out the door on the last day when someone has been hired and mentored

and my work here is done, but I leave STH in the hands of a very competent staff and Board. Please keep that in mind and continue supporting the good work of STH as a new person takes over."

Way back, I remember Susie, a client whose brain tumor had grown to the inoperable stage due to her crack addiction, but whose terminal illness brought reconciliation with her family through STH.



# It Takes a Community to Survive a Pandemic

Three days a week, food insecure families wait in long lines of vehicles to receive boxes filled with a week's worth of food and personal items at STH's drivethrough food pantry. In late 2020, the unemployment rate in Gary was still hovering at more than 14 percent—the highest in Indiana—and Feeding America's post-pandemic projections showed nearly 19 percent of Lake County residents were food insecure.

Vulnerable families share with us that they're living on such limited budgets they can't afford food. We've heard stories of intense worry and concern from many people whose situations are not improving but are worsening.

But in 2020 **YOU** and the following foundation and church partners responded to this need:

As of mid-December, more than \$81,000 was given for COVID-19 relief, which included food, personal protective equipment, and personal hygiene items. A \$5,000 COVID-19 match from First Merchants Bank also generated 57 donations totaling nearly \$5,690!

Your support to STH's food pantry program—Gary's largest—is making a difference for thousands of families. Between April 21st and December 3rd, STH staff and volunteers distributed more than 271,000 pounds of food to 7,594 families—4,048 of which had never sought help at STH before.

You also helped 33 families and individuals remain housed during this COVID crisis. And, during a unique situation in 2020 created when local homeless shelters could not take in new clients, you helped pay for 23 hotel stays to keep homeless families and individuals off the streets.

THANK YOU for being part of our community and helping thousands of Northwest Indiana residents survive the pandemic in 2020.

Our modified drive-through food pantry program is now able to operate out of our storage building in ALL weather, thanks to funding from The Citizens Savings Foundation.

The STH Child Enrichment Center provides the children of our clients with a safe, positive, nurturing environment close to their Moms, who can then focus on improving their life situations and obtain housing for their families.


